State of the Nation:

The next presidential election is due in 2016. However there has been much debate between the ruling party and opposition called Wamoja (Unity) about whether this will actually occur.

Local, state and national leaders all need to be elected. One proposal from the government is to begin with local government elections and continue to state and then

presidential. This would be a long process and the opposition party has indicated their concern that this would be used to prolong the mandate of the current president Kabila.

The president has begun a dialogue with civil society and the two main parties to find a solution.

Kindu Today – Malcolm and Elizabeth Richards

It was 2 years since our last visit to Kindu and 10 years since we first arrived in Kindu to work in the Diocese after the war.

Some things were still the same. It was dry season so the Congo river level was rapidly falling. Dug out motorised canoes were still the main form of transport on the Congo River connecting East and West Kindu. Outside the Bishop's house there was a line of people each

morning wanting to draw water from a natural spring in their garden. In the dry season this reduces to a trickle but early in the morning there is enough in the pool to draw buckets of water.

A major change was the sealed roads from the airport all the way into and around the centre of town. This has significantly reduced the dust and mud but increased the volume of traffic. Fewer people

now use bicycle taxisthere seem to be plenty of motor bikes to go round.

The 2015-2016 academic year began on the 7th September and this year caters for 3rd and Year students plus a course for wives of 3rd years. The college community continues to grow and this year should reach 37 with students, wives and young children.

A review of the Bible School course was held in August. It found that the course is meeting the goal

Diocesan Schools

Kindu Diocese currently manages 120 primary and secondary schools throughout the Maniema region.

All schools have been approved by the Government, but only half currently receive Government money for teachers salaries. The remaining schools rely on school fees to pay the teachers although in many villages this is very difficult.

Bishop Masimango describes a trip to an isolated part of Maniema: "Making a pastoral visit in the deep Equatorial forest in April 2015, I discovered many forgotten children who never have the opportunity to go to school. They live in remote areas where qualified teachers are not found. So I discussed with local authorities and church leaders how the Anglican Church can take a lead so that together we can build a school with an Anglican teacher. The idea was welcomed, parents are ready to work on bricks and the Diocese of Kindu could help in building three classrooms. Could you join the Diocese to offer these children an opportunity to study? They need someone to sponsor them. Most of their parents are Anglican farmers; they grow rice and cassava to feed their family. Because of inaccessibility there is no market for them to sell produce and get money to send their children for studies."
