PCC Updates

Mulbarton—21 Feb, 20 March; next meeting 24 April

Andrea Lovick joined us in February, as our PCC appointee on Mulbarton Community Choir, which functions under the umbrella of the church. The choir has 50-60 members, performs 4-5 times per year (Christmas carols, 2 concerts and "Doorway of Hope" at Norwich cathedral. We discussed safeguarding, privacy, finances, health and safety, which is all on track. We agreed to support Bev Theobald being licensed as an Authorised Worship Assistant, and talked through changes to the benefice service pattern, introducing bi-monthly "Wild Church", and suspending the monthly 8am service, promoting instead a monthly mid-week benefice communion in Flordon. We reviewed the recent sound system report, and noted the completion of the major tree work in the churchyard. We made more progress with EcoChurch status, and a strategy for clergy support. Of special concern is the need to recruit a new treasurer.

Sarah Miller joined us in March, whom we employ 9 hours per week to assist with admin. She reported positive feel about increased use of Harvest House, moves to EcoChurch and outreach to local community, including our porch foodbank, and new resources she is using to maintain relationships with wedding couples. We reviewed the church tables at the "Mind, Body, Spirit" fair, which had worked well. We minuted thanks to Jacqui Roper, who had been in touch with all volunteers who had been helping during lockdown, and identified the need to recruit someone to lead on carrying the local volunteer coordination project forward, until which time we would park it. We reviewed and progressed some finance and safeguarding items, and agreed a list of policies and procedures to keep under monitoring. We noted progress on active faculty cases: bench & bike rack granted; nest boxes, blinds & major renovation in process; and memorial tree extras postponed.

Bracon Ash—25 Jan; next meeting 23 April APCM

We reviewed upcoming changes in the deanery, reporting back from meeting with Bishop Ian on 23rd Jan, which secretary and treasurer had attended, still uncertain what the future will hold. We noted thanks for £1,813 income from the patron's winter concert, paid into the restricted building fund. We unanimously approved the accounts, ready to present at APCM. We noted the much needed repair of the oak gate post, and extra posts installed in the car park, and dealt with PCC training and practical arrangements for upcoming services.

Hethel—19 Feb; next meeting 9 April

The treasurer reported moving to the diocesan church finance package, in readiness to hand over. We agreed to trial a SumUp payment machine at the choir concert, & to place some legacy booklets in church. We were given List B approval to proceed with tower work. We agreed a plan to fill in paint the floor ledger-stone. We reviewed safeguarding status, deanery changes and past events and spent time planning future events, including holy week & rogation events, a bat walk, cream teas, and a possible eco event in partnership with NWT &/or WyNG.

Flordon—31 Jan; next meeting 23 April

The urgent Gift Aid reclaim is underway. We reviewed systems for maintaining churchyard, grateful to many volunteers who help, and agreed to ask Parish Council to review how they contribute. We noted that we only managed to pay £1500 out of £5150 towards parish share in 2023, just 29%, which left no reserves.

Hot cross buns at King John's Thorn afterwards, but the real attraction should be to step aside for awhile to contemplate the enormity of what God has done for us.

Further ahead, the Hethel APCM is on 22 May (7pm in church) and Beating the Bounds happens on 26 May, leaving the church at 2.30pm, back for tea and cake at 4.30.

So how do we reform ourselves? Well, there's only one person who can do that for us. And with His help, we can make a positive change in us and the world, one act and decision, at a time.



Ethical Christian #4

I'm writing this after a sunny day and lots of delicious signs of spring in terms of daffodils, blossom and some beautiful camellia and magnolia displays, so I thought about digging into Ethical Gardening!

There's no way I can cover everything here but just share a few thoughts, pointers, suppliers you might want to think about, look up or use.

1) Sounds simple (because it is) but be kind to your soil - MULCH.

Reincorporate organic matter left over from what you've grown, make your own compost or use an organic, peat free one: FertileFibre has 100% organic 100% peat free, award winning composts for a variety of purposes. They also have a DIY plastic free compost option that's worth checking out.

2) Carbon footprint - a big subject but some easy starters:

- Try to avoid plastic packaging and pots. Terracotta or galvanised metal ones would be better. Your broken terracotta ones can be used for drainage too.
- Natural methods for pest control. I use a milk solution on my roses to try and help against rose black spot. Nancy Birtwhistle has some recipes in her Clean and Green book for the garden I am planning to try this year. Why don't you share your natural methods that work for you. Send me them and I can put them together to share around the church community.
- Share cuttings/divided plants; local plant sales; allow areas to grow wild too (wonderful for biodiversity and local pollinators to have native plants or 'flowers in the wrong place'!)

Eco Church

In the last Mardle you may have read that the PCC has agreed that we will try to achieve at least the Bronze Eco Church award by July 2024. The PCC has identified some quick wins, such as installing a compost bin and a bike rack in the churchyard, both of which should be in place in the next few weeks.



However, to really embed the ethos of Eco Church and ensure that whatever we do is sustainable in the long run, we want everyone to feel involved with this and would value input from all members of the church family and beyond. We are hoping that a lot of people doing small things will ultimately result in a big change.

We know we can utilise the experience from other churches who have taken this path and certainly connecting with other organisations and groups in the village such as the school, MALGA Environment Group, and the uniform groups, would be part of the process, as we will be able to achieve far more by working together with others in the community.

In order to take this forward, a group of interested church members would be wonderful. An initial meeting will take place on **Mon 20th May, 7:30pm at Jill Wright's home, 22 Birchfield Gardens.**

This will be an opportunity to learn more about Eco Church, find out what other churches have been doing, and begin to plan what we might be able to achieve and decide on one of two ideas we can realistically put in place over the next year. If you cannot make the meeting but are still interested, do contact me and I will keep you in touch with the way forward.

How to be a greener Christian #12

“Plastic is a dazzling example of how we humans invent things and start using them without really understanding the impacts.” So quotes Mike Berners-Lee in How Bad are Bananas. “... Bad, he agrees, but “they have a pretty low carbon footprint”. Au contraire, the Good Energy blog asserts, “By mid-century, plastic is predicted to take up 13-17% of the planet’s carbon budget.” Massive! Read the full article at bit.ly/plastic-climate



As I’ve said before, part of what we can (ought to?!) do is to make our views felt to politicians, local, national and international. Noisily and obstreperously where necessary! Avaaz (secure.avaaz.org/page/en/highlights/) does good work – you can use the pink box to sign up for regular petition opportunities. But can we cash in on the looming general election? I hope so: as a benefice we’re going to try to get candidates here for a ‘climate hustings’ when the moment is right. Make sure you come, listen, question, make your point and consider your vote.

If you’re lucky enough to have a non-government pension, you can also exert pressure by asking awkward questions of the provider. bit.ly/goodpensions has some alarming headlines, such as “UK-based pension schemes have more than £88 billion invested in fossil fuel firms such as Shell and BP, the equivalent of £3,000 per pension policyholder. Meanwhile, for every £10 put into a pension, £2 is helping to fund deforestation.”

As you probably know, the internet is a recipe treasure trove! Not least the BBC good food archive.

This month try Herby rice with roasted veg, chickpeas & halloumi? Go to bit.ly/bbcgf1. To critique myself, it uses courgettes and peppers, grown at this time of year in Israel, Morocco, Netherlands, Spain or the UK (too many food miles). Halloumi has a slightly bigger carbon footprint than cheddar.
