A substantial amount of Mulbarton finances are restricted, so can only be spent on certain things—more than £60,000 over the course of the last two years, mostly given to support local and overseas mission, and people in hardship, as well as some for churchyard, specific fabric projects, Mardlers and Community Choir. And the £150,000 internal redevelopment project will be funded from restricted funds and grant money. That is great that we are still able to spend on these important things, even when the general fund is struggling. Our strategy for handling increased general running costs has been to seek the Holy Spirit's guidance and persevere with doing the right things, trusting God through this season of shortfall. Please pray for wisdom and provision.

Bracon Ash has a handful of inspirational, faithful and generous local donors, and is grateful for the patron's winter concert fundraiser which has given a welcome boost the last couple of years and is becoming a fixture. Hethel has a mix of generous donors and creative fundraising, using its beautiful setting and new(ish) facilities to best effect to bless the community, and incidentally raise funds along the way.

Together we do the best we can with what we have to work together for the kingdom of God. A special blessing has been the hardship fund, although administered by Mulbarton, very much a benefice endeavour. Huge thanks to Naomi for her sponsored head shave, which has so far added about £1600 into that, specially to help children with cancer. In addition, our winter disbursements this week distributed £1000 between 18 households.

In the last 3 years, we have received about $\pounds 2000$ from grants, $\pounds 8000$ from local gifts, $\pounds 1500$ from historic endowments and interest, and $\pounds 2000$ from Gift Aid. With that we have been able to help about 40 households, which has been such a privilege, and made a huge difference.

were all freed; wealth and property were all redistributed equally; and farming paused while fields rested. That was the idea anyway! In practice, people struggled to embrace these things. I wonder why?!?

I can't help but reflect on all the changes and challenges, joys and sorrows, hellos and goodbyes, in the parishes and worshiping communities here over these years, and also reflect on the lessons we draw from ancient Jubilee wisdom.

Cancelling debts—the power of forgiveness, even towards ourselves, letting go of regrets, grudges, burdens.

Freeing slaves—building community, striving for equality and justice, respect and dignity for all, raising up the down-trodden.

Wealth redistribution—being generous with what we have, be it time, skills or money, making sure our limited resources are shared equally, so that nobody goes without, and nobody hoards up too much—thinking communally. Resting the fields—taking time to recharge and rejuvenate—and also trusting that we don't have to be in control, that provision will be made for us—and ecological wisdom, respecting and nurturing our planet.



May we continue to live out these principles as best we can in the churches in this corner of God's world: offering safe space for all to come and find connection with a forgiving God of new beginnings; Eco-church forays; helping the downtrodden; trusting God when there is a budget shortfall; and so many more ways we seek to live these wonderful Jubilee values.

PCC Updates

Mulbarton-7 Oct; 18 Nov; next meeting 13 Jan 2025

We are grateful for the time and dedication that Mollie and Ajavi have put in on the PCC, and wish them well as circumstances have meant they can no longer give the time required for the roles. New PCC members always welcome! Stephen has joined PCC with a view to taking on the role as treasurer over the coming months. Mollie will continue to have an advisory role, helping the PCC decide how to spend from Hardship fund (see back pages), especially where therapeutic intervention may be offered. Bike rack & bench have been installed. New blinds will be installed soon. We continue to think options through for how to plan for the future in terms of providing a burial ground for the parish. We have several appeals for different reasons and causes-thank you to all who have contributed. We are in process of reviewing the memorandum of governance for the Community Choir; and of course making progress with safeguarding, and accommodating changing frameworks. We are forecasting to miss the full parish share by at least £10,000 again this year. We are reviewing our spending priorities. We have almost £50,000 in reserved funds for the renovation project, and we now have an architect estimate for the full cost of what we hope to do, which would require about another £100,000 in grants. The faculty application will go in soon, with a view to beginning grant applications. The result would be a toilet in the bell rower, a raised ringing platform, kitchen facilities in back corner, a repaired and relocated font, repaired and tidied up flooring, removal of several back pews to open up a more flexible space at the back of church, and some new furniture. Watch this space!

Bracon Ash—18 Nov; next meeting 9 Jan 2025

We continue to explore plans and funding for completing the necessary repairs and renovations, with the church architect. First phase is achievable, to complete both phases, grants are required and being sought with support of diocese. We tabled Eco Church review for spring 2025. We are grateful to patron for fundraising concert on 6th Dec.

Hethel—12 Nov; next meeting 7 Jan 2025

We reviewed grants for tower work, and only £10,000 short of target with several more grant irons in the fire. Agreed to commence work asap. We are working on issues relating to the public footpath through churchyard, and safeguarding changes. New church info leaflets are being produced. Usual events are going ahead in coming months, including winter crumpets.

Flordon-20 Nov; next meeting 7 Jan 2025

Church porch urgent repairs going ahead in memory of Margaret. Church volunteers did great job helping maintain churchyard. Parish council agreed a $\pounds600$ annual grant from 2025. Forecasting shortfall on parish share, paying total of $\pounds2,150$ out of the $\pounds5,150$ request (42%). Glebe committee will hold onto glebe land strips surrounding churchyard.

Finances Across the Four Parishes

Over the last 15 years, all the churches have had to adapt to increased costs. Income levels have varied across the parishes. In particular Flordon and Mulbarton have struggled in recent years, as the table below shows, especially with parish share. Flordon historically put huge effort into fundraising events; but as the request has increased, despite increasing donors, capacity of volunteers has diminished. Mulbarton is being asked for over £16,000 more in 2025 than in 2013, and despite cutting other costs, the generous giving of donors (which is so wonderful and humbling) has not been able to match that steep increase.

Ethical Christian #8 BOOKS

'T'was the night before Christmas and all through the house.

Rachel was so grateful for the books from her spouse!'

I love a good book at Christmas (well actually any time of year!): the excitement and joy in being lost in other lives and worlds on my sofa, in bed or the bath is such a pleasure.



We also hear these words every Christmas too: In the beginning was the Word....a word that was made flesh; a word that walked amongst us; word that talked of love and justice. So it feels pertinent to think about how we can be ethical whether you're an e-book, audio or print consumer. How can gifting books this Christmas spread a bit of justice?

Obviously, other times of the year, libraries, swapping books with friends, finding one in the phone box by the World's End or charity shops are great ethical ways to enjoy a good read, but sometimes we want to buy them as a present. We've all felt the lure of convenience, cheapness and instant delivery from Amazon books (Audible and Abebooks too) but it comes with a price: a huge list of workers' rights abuses, unsustainable business practices and blatant tax avoidance are a start. All three score a whopping 0 from the Ethical Consumer!

So what can guide us away from this.....

Check out local, independent sellers: it helps keep high streets alive and ensures authors are paid fairly. Kett's books in Wymondham is a wonderful example to explore; The Book Hive, Bookbugs and Dragon Tales and the Doormouse Bookshop are just a few independent bookshops in Norwich and then the Book Hive in Alysham and the amazing Norfolk Children's Book Centre a bit past Aylsham.

Choose online providers with good ethics. Best for print books: AwesomeBooks, Better World Books, Biblio, Guardian Bookshop, Oxfam, and World of Books. All but the Guardian sell secondhand books too. Best for ebooks: Ebooks.com. Best for audiobooks: xigxag.

Apart from Amazon, Wordery, Waterstones, Hatchard's, Foyles, Blackwells and ebay books also score very low and are worth avoiding.

So have a wonderful wordy Christmas and spread a bit of word love with where you purchase your books from too. Rachel Burchell

SUPPORT FOR D R CONGO

Mulbarton Church has supported work in D R Congo for more than 25 years, financially and in prayer. This is a country in the heart of Africa, straddled by the equator. It has 2250 km of tarred roads, of which only 1226 km are classed as 'in good condition'. That is little more than the distance from Norwich to the far north of Scotland – for a country the size of Western Europe! That puts travel into perspective! Add into the mix the insecurity, especially in the east of the country, and the high cost of air travel, and you can begin to imagine the problems faced by leaders of the Anglican church in that vast country.

To help us pray for those leaders, here are some extracts from latest newsletter of the Congo Church Association, produced at the end of October:

Archbishop Ande is well respected throughout the Anglican Communion. He is extremely busy with his diocesan, provincial and international responsibilities. It is not easy having the Provincial Office in different parts of the country. Last year he met with other Archbishops in Uganda. In consultation with the Dioceses, he is now drawing up a 5-year strategic plan and mapping out where to plant new churches. Pray for vision, safety, endurance and flexibility.

Bishop William of Boga (a volcanic region near the Rwanda border) writes: 'We have not lost hope. Our God is faithful. All the armed groups are like active volcanoes: they erupt at any moment.'

Bishop Martin in Goma (at the north end of Lake Kivu) writes: 'In spite of all that is happening 'the believers in Goma continue to live their 'ordinary' lives with extraordinary faithfulness – seeking how to love and serve God and neighbour. We broaden our work on peace-building, now working more closely with the UN and civil society to strengthen the role of the church in mediation and conflict resolution.'

BUKAVU (also close to the Rwanda border) is the Diocese we support financially, with Mulbarton PCC pledging £800 a year. Plans are in hand for the southern part of the huge Bukavu Diocese to become a separate Diocese of Lake Tanganyika, where Missionary Bishop Elisha Tendwa from Tanzania is laying the foundations for a new diocese of 5 archdeaconries. Pray for: · A growth of Christian unity and depth of fellowship in this and other new dioceses. · For good leadership by the



How to be a greener Christian #15

Against a background of gloom – a climatecautious if not climate-denying president-elect in the US and the United Nations climate summit COP29 taking place in oil-rich Azerbaijan where that country's leaders opened by championing fossil fuels – it was encouraging to hear Sir Kier Starmer promise that Britain would cut



greenhouse gas emissions by 81% by 2035. "We're building on our reputation as a climate leader," he said. The new goal is in line with a recommendation from the UK's Committee on Climate Change, which said last month the target should exceed the current 78% cut to emissions, measured against 1990 levels.

Meanwhile, Dr Roz Savage MP's Climate and Nature Bill's Second Reading in Parliament is on 24 January 2025 with extensive support across the political spectrum. Its long title is at bills.parliament.uk/ bills/3776; you can sign up to do your tiny bit to support it at www.zerohour.uk.

Christmas is coming! My beloved *Bananas* book has two pages devoted to avoiding excess, estimating that a low-carbon event could 'cost' 4kg CO_2e (equivalent carbon dioxide emissions) per adult cf an average Christmas of 280kg CO_2e - seventy times more! Make sure your fairy lights are LED. Minimise giving unwanted stuff: gifts only to children? price cap on gifts? use a Secret Santa generator so that each person only gives one gift and receives one gift (eg

www.drawnames.co.uk)? reduce food waste and eat more plant-based protein?

For many years, we've been members of the Centre for Alternative Technology: £30 a year to be "a member who'll receive *Clean Slate* magazine, special event invitations, and more. Most importantly, you'll be part of a community that supports, practically, politically and educationally, urgent solutions to the climate and biodiversity crisis. The current mag includes "Winter Feast Recipes", referencing World Vegan Month (November) and Veganuary. Tofu masala curry looks good. This recipe and plenty more is on CAT staff member Dr Cathy Cole's Kitchen 1.5 blog (<u>kitchenonepointfive.home.blog/</u>). Do keep your eye on daily protein intake though – you need 250g of nuts, 800g peas, 625g of lentils, $2\frac{1}{2}$ pints of milk, 7 large eggs, or about 200g of chicken, meat or prawns. (That's OR not AND!) Growing, harvesting and bringing the nuts to market takes 130g CO₂e, the pulses 420g, the milk 1.6kg and
