HSBC 2, Barclays 0, Chase 0 and First Direct 2 banks are massive financiers of fossil fuels and have been linked to multiple human rights abuses. Lloyds, Halifax, Bank of Scotland, Lloyds Banking <u>Group</u> (Lloyds 6, Halifax 30, Bank of Scotland 6), NatWest Group (NatWest 2, RBS, Coutts 2, Ulster Bank 2) and Santander (Santander 2, Cater Allen 2) have also been criticised for multiple unethical investments.

I changed my bank last year, after ethical research, and found it so easy. Government regulation has made it so: https://

PCC Updates

Mulbarton—12 Feb & 12 Mar; next meeting 9 Apr 2025

Denis Tuttle has agreed to do one more for us (he has since agreed to!). We noted thanks for various practical jobs that have been completed. The major reordering project is pending a site visit by DAC, scheduled end of March. We noted Jill Wright's upcoming retirement, and discussed how best to honour her many years of faithful service in the parish. We continue to make progress with safeguarding compliance, environment policy and equality policy, noting where further explorations and actions are required. We are in process of reviewing our spending priorities in order to manage the budgeted shortfall. This year the projected shortfall is only £5,500, which is considerably less than £12,500 last year, for which we give thanks. Harvest House continues to be well used, and has benefited from a professional steam clean of carpets and another new table to serve growing groups of hirers.

Bracon Ash—Next meeting 1 May 2025

PCC did not meet in February or March. We continue to rally in support of our churchwarden, detained in Australia, and have been keeping Alf and Heather in our prayers. Grant applications and plans for major works continue to roll.

Hethel—24 Feb; next meeting 28 April

We passed the milestone of raising enough to fully fund the Tower and Bell restoration project—although work has paused until 1st April because we found bats hibernating. We discussed churchyard maintenance, safeguarding and equality policy, as well as the Prayers of Love and Faith—but no decisions to make, or actions outstanding, at this time. We continue to give thanks for well-supported events and services and the oasis of welcome offered to visitors.

Ethical Christian #10 BANKING: Current Accounts

I don't know about you, but I have signed up to the Carbon Fast for Lent by Climate Stewards. One of their challenges was to see if your bank invested in fossil fuels, and it reminded me how choosing an ethical bank account is one of the most ethically productive things we can do. The Bible is clear we are not to love money, but be generous and good stewards of it. If we have a heart to provide for those in need; protect our planet; fight injustice but our money is with organizations that are undoing that, then we need to think seriously how we can change that dissonance.

So what is 'ethical banking'? The Ethical Consumer uses these criteria:

doesn't invest your money in things like fossil fuels, weapons, gambling, tobacco and other unethical industries - ensuring its policies and advertising match its practice does pay its fair share of tax does invest your money in positive areas, such as renewable energy

For this article, I'll provide information for current accounts but feel free, as always, to discuss savings accounts or any other issues with me. This is such a broad stroke article and I have much more information if anyone is ever interested to know more about their bank.

As of 2022, Triodos at the moment is the top scorer with 96, though it does charge £3 a month to maintain its current account. However, Coop/Smile and Nationwide are non charging alternatives, who also provide credit cards, with scores of 74 and 70 respectively. (As some of these banks have been acquisitioned by other companies, their scores will be re examined next month, but as pre-acquisition practices likely to be sustained for short term these scores are still best indicators at present)

Biodiversity loss is of growing concern, as Bishop Graham repeatedly advises, but Roz Savage MP's Climate and Nature Bill is unlikely to proceed to Second Reading. Bad news or good? Probably good because Minister for Nature Mary Creagh MP has assured that "[governmental] next steps would include 'binding commitments' to advance the bill's objectives" while Secretary Ed Miliband MP promised "to set to work on the 'spirit and substance' of the bill—'including for legislation'—in order to 'make a meaningful difference' for climate and nature". Pray these good folk deliver on their promises.

Anything on that theme that we can take into the rest of **Lent**? What about **Salisbury Diocese's** <u>Get outside for Lent</u> booklet? Six things to do and a short liturgy on each of six different themes: https://bit.ly/lentoutside.

What else could we pray or do to reflect on the season?

Laudato Si' was written by Pope Francis in 2015. It "remains a profound invitation to everyone on the planet to care for our common home" to quote the CAFOD site



from where it can be downloaded (https://bit.ly/cafodsi). Read it as a devotional activity during April, a little at a time?

Inevitably I spend time with 'older' people who may have more time, but I've been surprised recently by the amount of story-sharing that involved flying. "Just back from Malaga for a few days' break" etc. So I was interested to discover a House of Commons Library Research Briefing Aviation and Climate Change, which notes that passengers through UK airports increased from 101m. in 1990 to 297m. in 2019. The same document observes that 16% of the UK's greenhouse gas emissions will be from aviation by 2035 (7% in 2022), despite efficiencies and economies.

We will go by train to Perpignan in September but could fly from Stansted for less than 40% of the price. Doesn't feel right to me!

For tea next week, Nigel Slater's chickpea soup-stew. Soften a chopped onion in a little oil. Add two finely sliced garlic cloves, half a chopped red chilli, two teaspoons of garam masala and cook for a couple of minutes.
