WITH THE VILLAGES OF MULBARTON,



You may have already met, but just in case you haven't, or you're curious to know more, I'd like to introduce you to Rev Di Rowlandson who has retired and moved into Mulbarton last year. Di has been give permission to officiate here, which means she will be helping out with services in the Benefice from time to time, including over the Christmas period. Di shared some of her story with the editor for Mulbarton's Parish News, and I wanted to share that among all four churches too:

So Di, tell us how you came to be a vicar in Norfolk...

"Actually, I grew up in Norwich but left to get married and work in South Buckinghamshire. My husband was a clergyman whilst I worked as a physio and Pilates teacher. We also had two children, one of whom now lives in Mulbarton with his family. Naturally, this is one of the reasons I have now settled here.

Sadly, my husband Gary died in 2004 after a time of illness. This led to a move and, eventually, a realisation that I too had a calling to re-train to take up a role in the Church of England. It was after this process was completed that I found myself drawn back to Norwich in 2018. For the following 6 years



I had a role as the vicar for the Earlham Benefice, based at St Anne's Church on the ring road."

And what does life look like now?

"On retirement last year, I moved out to my lovely cottage in Mulbarton where I have joined the congregation at St Mary's Church. Apart from helping out by taking services from time to time, I also enjoy going to the gym and singing in the UEA choir. I also have a passion to help people answer

their questions about life and how finding a faith in Jesus might help them with this. Along with a team of others from Mulbarton Church I am starting up a course in January where anyone can come along and ask questions about life and faith."

As you read the rest of this Mardle, you'll see some of the many ways our churches are quietly walking alongside our community this Christmas and into the New Year. How to be a greener Christian #22

COP30 – the 30^{th} Conference of the Parties, ie countries that have signed the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change (UNFCCC) – is happening right now (ends 21.11.25). Search online for "COP30" for updates or an end-of report. The Guardian blog looked useful. Major nations are not represented: US (11%); India (8%); China (29%) – the figures are each country's contribution to global emissions. This does not bode well, but one has some sympathy with world leaders deluged with problems, not least wars. Given that *How bad are bananas?* estimated the 'annual global military bootprint' to be 3.3 billion tonnes of CO_2e in 2020 – over 8% of all annual emissions – if you need another reason for us to stop fighting each other, here it is.

A useful long BBC article on the implications of patchy attendance is at bit.ly/COPpurpose, with interesting data about how the Chinese economy is focussing on 'global green growth'. Hopefully it'll help them to get their 29% down as well.

A wake-up call for us was when the sustainability consultant for the housing development in which we're involved said *cooling* for all new apartments and houses should be considered. Data suggests that significant, health-harming heatwaves will be a regular feature of the UK climate within 10-20 years so if we want to sleep at night and avoid residents buying bulky, energy-expensive portable air-conditioners, we'd better install ASHPs for cooling as well as heating.

Christmas is coming! In 2007 The Stockholm Environmental Institute (York University) published "The carbon cost of Christmas", which is still widely quoted. Headline: Our total consumption and spending on food, travel, lighting and gifts over three days of festivities could result in 650 kg of carbon dioxide emissions (CO₂) per person – equivalent to the weight of 1,000 Christmas puddings! This is 5.5% of our total annual carbon footprint. Gulp! But it's easy to save 615 of those puddings - read how at bit.ly/xmascarbon. Check out the main author's prize-shortlisted My Dad the Earth Warrior as a gift for tweenage (grand)children – second hand, of course, if you can.

BBC Good Food can offer you 203 (!) vegetarian Christmas recipes to help follow one strand of that Stockholm / York advice at: bit.ly/veggyxmas. Do what you can to dispel the notion that vegetarian food is insipid (years ago it was?) – I'm going to try out the Chestnut, Spinach & Blue Cheese en croute.

Benefice Christmas Card

Last year, the Eco Church Group created a Benefice Christmas card that was circulated around the four churches during advent. Everyone was encouraged to send Christmas messages to other people in the Benefice via this card and to donate the money they would have spent on individual cars to the charity the church was supporting over the Christmas period. Last year as a result of this, we were able to send over £150 to Embrace the Middle East, a Christian charity tackling poverty and injustice in the Middle East.



We will be repeating this initiative this year, starting at the Service of Light at Flordon on 30th November. The aim is that the card should be available twice at each of the four churches in the Benefice over the Advent period, to give everyone the opportunity to both write a message and to read those from other everyone else. Money donated will again go to the charity Embrace the Middle East.
