In August, 31 representatives from all four parishes gathered in Harvest House to think about the future of our benefice. If you have not had notes, please get in touch to ask—I would be delighted to hear your thoughts.

FOLLOWING JESUS

Sharing the journey

WITH THE VILLAGES OF MULBARTON, FLORDON, BRACON ASH AND HETHEL



- 1. Humbleyard Deanery is set to disband altogether, with us as a benefice becoming part of Depwade, to the south.
- 2. We anticipated changes in personnel and populations, and trends locally, as well as at diocesan and national level that might affect how we function. We then opened the floor for anyone to share hopes and fears for the next five years, noting 21 hopes (to plan for) and 9 fears (to avoid or mitigate). A few things came up in both lists, like merging PCCs!
- 3. We noted especially the financial concerns, with costs up, income down, reserves low, and non-balancing core budgets. We were realistic about the challenges, yet solution-focused in our thinking. Key points were to nurture a generous attitude, strategic thinking, and clear goals at parish level.
- 4. We explored volunteer vacancies and succession planning, noting the importance of making volunteer positions attractive and meaningful.
- 5. We took stock of the good things we are already doing, and how to build on that in a changing world, making best use of our resources to focus on the true purpose of our mission and witness. This included consideration of the recent report from the Church Buildings Commission.
- 6. We concluded by moving towards what actions individual PCCs might want to consider as we move into the future, including eco-friendly initiatives, fair trade practices, and improved communication channels.

PCCs will be working on tailoring local action plans and priorities from this in due course, and welcome thoughts and feedback from all.

PCC Updates

Mulbarton (October & November)

We explored EcoChurch and ethical banking, two issues raised at the APCM. Good to hear from Peter about Hethel's experience. We decided to stick with the Bank of Scotland for our current account, since it gives us a fair balance of ethical rating for the facilities we need. We will explore options for our investment accounts, where there is greater potential to bank more ethically. On the EcoChurch front, we progressed towards a Bronze award, and agreed to install a bike rack, to encourage travel by bike. We also moved to 100% fair-traded goods in Harvest House.

We have a war grave sign agreed and now being prepared, and made progress on installing three new blinds. We identified significant tree work, much of it done, with more to follow. We researched cherry tree options, to respond to a community need for a space in the village to mourn neonatal and antenatal bereavement. We thrashed through content for a needs statement for redeveloping the back of church.

We continued to monitor and agree actions for community engagement, mission, Sunday services, youth and families work, safeguarding, Harvest House management and the challenging financial situation, with increasing costs and decreasing income. The PCC carefully considered the recent clergy covenant, and how best they could continue to support the benefice clergy and families (e.g. publicising days off—see front page!)

Sue Mellows has served as treasurer faithfully for five years now, ably supported by Symon, for which we are hugely grateful. She will be stepping down from the post at the end of this year, so we are looking to recruit someone to take on that role—please do be in touch with Adrian or Sue if this is something you might consider.

Bracon Ash (September)

We celebrated the completion of recent major building repairs, and considered next actions arising from the last Quinquennial report; along with services and planned events, including the patron's fundraising winter concert; and more general finances. We recorded thanks for Cyndy's work with flower arranging, as she hands on that baton.

Hethel (September & November)

We dealt with maintenance issues, and made progress with the big tower restoration project. We also considered a paper Peter had drafted in response to the benefice future meeting, working towards a parish plan.

Flordon (October)

We noted responses to the finances leaflet, and dealt with events, past and future, changes needed for Gift Aid, and churchyard management issues.



Wrapping presents - Wrapping paper is a recycling nightmare. Many of the shiny foil options contain plastic (glitter is almost always plastic); even the cheaper, thinner paper versions are hard to recycle.

I love **Re-wrapped** which use 100% recycled unbleached materials and vegan friendly vegetable inks in their paper, and all are recyclable and biodegradable with wonderful designs (not only for Christmas), but there are many other places that sell wrapping paper with these attributes. Also, check that your paper comes in compostable packaging, not plastic, and use paper-based sticky tape or natural string or twine to secure. Alternatively, wrap presents in old newspapers or magazines or try out Furoshiki, the Japanese art of wrapping presents in reusable cloths or scarves.



Christmas cards - look for cards that are foil and glitter-free and recyclable cards and obviously benefit a charity of your choice: Oxfam, The Woodland Trust, RSPB, Amnesty International all fulfil those criteria and there are many more besides.

Christmas Trees - what is the most ethical? This is a big discussion and I've probably used enough space, so if you're interested in thinking further about this here are two links I'd recommend following and reading the articles and thoughts.

Being ethical is one way to help that in a real, physical way - to allow those who produce our goods etc to be fairly paid and have fair working conditions. There are so many easy ways for it to be ethical and money conscious in these difficult times.

I love this quotation by Emma Odie at the Ethical Consumer:

"Ethical gifting is all about choosing gifts with low impact and making sure that every gift counts in the most important way."

We know we can buy from charity shops, preloved, gifting time or experiences or making things yourself or buying new fairly trade ethical presents as ways to make our Christmas giving count. I don't want to just list a whole page of places where you can buy ethical pressies but a great place to get ideas of where to start

Avoid Amazon - look I've been caught, and occasionally still am, by the convenience, the cheap prices and immediate deliveries but I can't avoid the huge list of workers' rights abuses, its unsustainable business practices and its blatant tax avoidance, so I'm trying to change my habits. How to be a greener Christian #10

Last Mardle, I threatened to get political! After all, as Desmond Tutu famously said, "When people say that religion and politics don't mix, I wonder which Bible they are reading." Here goes!

Let's start with the Five Marks of Mission. Drafted by the Anglican Communion, it seeks to answer the simple but profound theological question: What is God's mission in the world today? With which the church must align itself! The Marks are:

- To proclaim the Good News of the Kingdo	□ T	o proclaim t	e Good News	s of the Kingdom
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☐ To teach, baptise and nurture new believers.

☐ To respond to human need by loving service.

☐ To seek to transform unjust structures of society, to challenge violence of every kind and to pursue peace and reconciliation.

☐ To strive to safeguard the integrity of creation and sustain and renew the life of the earth.

Doesn't climate care tick at least the last three of those boxes? We are on the fringes of the political here, at least in terms of exercising one's vote and interacting with elected representatives.

Next year we'll be limbering up for the general election and thinking about how to vote. Perhaps a starting point is to ask which issues are (most) existential, for us, our children or our grandchildren?

You'll guess where I'm heading! But it's not a singular answer – for example, the widening gap between the rich and the poor might deprive many people of any significant quality of life and a lower quantity. But if climate change is on the list, which party offers the best hope of averting a crisis down the line? One party believes that kicking the can down the road is necessary given current economic pressures; another argues for minimising the risk of disaster in the 2040s, making a virtue out of a necessity now by promoting the manufacture and installation of measures to reduce carbon emissions. You do your own probing and thinking; just don't ignore the issue!

COP28 runs from 30.11.23 to 12.12.23. Use the programme (unfccc.int/cop28) to inform your prayers, especially in regard to 'negotiations'. Avoiding out-of-season vegetables, what about Lentil Wedges for tea? Boil 225g red lentils in 450ml water until the liquid is absorbed. Finely chop a large onion and fry in 1tbsp oil until transparent. Mix onion, lentils, 100g grated cheddar, 5ml mixed herbs, 25g breadcrumbs, an egg, salt and pepper.

Press into an oiled 23cm sandwich tin and bake for 30 minutes at 190C. Delicious with mash, carrots, greens and perhaps some gravy made with veggy stock and a little cornflour.
